MAYOR FIORE: This is the Board of Trustees meeting for the Village of North Haven, Wednesday, November 15th.

We'll start with the Pledge of Allegiance.
(Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.)

MAYOR FIORE: Okay. We have a -not a long, but a very interesting agenda to go over.

We will start with the approval of minutes from the last meeting in October, right? Yeah, the October Board of Trustees meeting. Ed sent them to us. Are there any comments, any corrections, any conclusions, any observations?

MS. DIAT: Not from me.
MAYOR FIORE: Nothing?
MR. BOODY: Nope.
MAYOR FIORE: Nothing?
MR. ABRAHAM: No.
MAYOR FIORE: Nothing?
We can then --

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MR. ABRAHAM: Make a motion.
MAYOR FIORE: -- make a motion to
close the minutes discussion, correct?
MR. BOODY: Well, minutes to --
(Crosstalk)
MAYOR FIORE: Move to approve and accept the minutes from the October meeting.

MR. BOODY: So moved.
MAYOR FIORE: Thank you. So moved.

MS. DIAT: I'll second.
ALL BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
MAYOR FIORE: There are no public
hearings tonight.
Presentation of Claim Vouchers.
Ed, do you want to take us through these?
MR. DEYERMOND: Yeah. We have
schedule number -- Warrant No. 11 is the General Fund Warrant. Again, nothing really extraordinary, nothing new, nothing surprising in there.

We have Warrant No. 12, which is a Parks Warrant for our Village Attorney for

Parks \& Rec charges. Again, nothing -nothing out of the ordinary there. A lot of that stuff is planning for the park up on Sunset Beach Road.

MAYOR FIORE: I just have a question --

MR. DEYERMOND: Yes.
MAYOR FIORE: -- on Warrant 11.
On page 2, $\$ 1,700$ for the pest management, is that an annual charge?

MR. DEYERMOND: For who now?
MAYOR FIORE: The third one down.
MR. DEYERMOND: No. That was -that was the contract to come in and take care of the problem we had here in the building.

MAYOR FIORE: The cockroach problem.

MR. DEYERMOND: Covers everything.
MAYOR FIORE: Okay. So it covers his future visits, too?

MR. DEYERMOND: Yup.
MAYOR FIORE: Okay, good. Thank you.

MR. DEYERMOND: One of which will
be tomorrow and --
MAYOR FIORE: Yes.
MR. DEYERMOND: -- I think he had one more after that.

MAYOR FIORE: The other one was \$7,400, Community Development Solutions.

MR. BOODY: Right.
MAYOR FIORE: Who are they?
MR. DEYERMOND: That is the new building department and planning website that they're switching over.

MAYOR FIORE: Oh, that's the old --

MR. DEYERMOND: From Municity.
It's the old Municity.
MAYOR FIORE: Oh, it's the old Municity.

MR. DEYERMOND: Switching over to Municity Program 5.

MAYOR FIORE: Oh, okay.
MR. DEYERMOND: And we encumbered that money in the past. And the folks have been training on it in the office and

I think there's more training set for next week.

MAYOR FIORE: Yeah. It's been installed and we're working with it, right?

MR. DEYERMOND: It's been installed and we're working it.

MAYOR FIORE: The last question $I$ have is Southampton Excavation, 2,800. Is that the RCA that's been there for six months?

MR. DEYERMOND: Yes, it is.
MAYOR FIORE: Oh, okay.
MR. DEYERMOND: I got a call from them just the other day, $I$ think it was Monday, and they said that they hadn't gotten the check. I says, "Well, I haven't gotten the bill."

So we -- I said to please send one over, which $I$ have right here, and we'll be paying that tonight, unless that is to be donated by someone --

MR. DEYERMOND: -- or is it to be north haven bot - Regular meeting - 11/15/2023 offset --

MAYOR FIORE: It's the RCA we bought and then we decided that we weren't going to use it because it was too close to the pond.

And the last decision that $I$ know of is we were going to give it away. You were gonna ask people that you know. I've asked people that $I$ know. I know one landscaper who came and took a half a pile, but there's still three-and-a-half piles there.

MR. DEYERMOND: Yup.
MAYOR FIORE: Yeah. So if you know anybody.

MR. DEYERMOND: We're still -yeah, we're still --

MAYOR FIORE: It's free.
MR. DEYERMOND: In fact, George and I are trying to track down somebody in North Haven that might need it.

MAYOR FIORE: Yeah, good.
MR. DEYERMOND: So we're working that angle.

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MAYOR FIORE: Good.
MR. DEYERMOND: But the main issue
is still here unresolved. We are paying for it.

MAYOR FIORE: But we have to pay for it, yeah. But the 501 should pay us. MR. DEYERMOND: Okay.

MAYOR FIORE: Should transfer that \$2, 800 .

MR. DEYERMOND: Okay.
MAYOR FIORE: It's just like the 8,000 for Jackson Dodds.

MR. DEYERMOND: Yup. So I'll put that in my folders --

MAYOR FIORE: Yeah.
MR. BOODY: I got a question.
MAYOR FIORE: Yes, sir.
MR. DEYERMOND: -- for
reimbursement.

MR. BOODY: On the number for Chris Miller, the 11,800, that is for his services? It's not for corn, right? That's a separate charge?

MR. DEYERMOND: That 11,000 was

MR. BOODY: Yeah. That's --
MR. DEYERMOND: Not the corn. The corn is paid through Talmage.

MR. BOODY: It just reminded me that --

MAYOR FIORE: The corn is also on here somewhere.

MR. BOODY: Yeah, that's another 2, 800 .

MR. DEYERMOND: Yup. He goes through a lot of corn.

MAYOR FIORE: They eat it.
MR. BOODY: It just reminded me that at one point we said at a meeting two or three months ago maybe that we'd have Chris come in and give a report and let us know what he found out in the last tick drag, if that's appropriate, and also --

MAYOR FIORE: Has he done it?
MR. ABRAHAM: We can do that. We just got -- Terie and $I$ just got the tick drag.

MS. DIAT: We just got it a couple


MR. ABRAHAM: No, it was like -(Crosstalk)

MAYOR FIORE: And we would compare it to the same time last year?

MS. DIAT: Yes.
MAYOR FIORE: The drag --
MS. DIAT: Exactly.

Stop work orders, he has here zero, but you issued a couple in October, yeah. So these are just stop work orders that he would have issued? He can't. MR. BUTTS: I did it. MAYOR FIORE: Yeah, okay. He has zero. North Haven general patrol, three. North Haven follow-up, six. Any questions on --

MR. BOODY: I thought the North Haven complaint section where he talks about the trailer and the rear driveway and he checked the code and determined that it did not refer to enclosed trailers, only recreational vehicles, I kind of wonder if that's a little hint that there's a problem with the code, the language of the code.

I mean, I looked at what those sections refer to. One is the definition of trailers and the other forbids trailers
from being used as a living quarters,
essentially, $I$ think is what it says.
MAYOR FIORE: Right.

MR. BOODY: And I'm wondering why there was nothing to the complaint, in his view, after he checked the code. It just makes me wonder if there's something -some loophole that allowed somebody to keep an enclosed trailer in their driveway.

MR. BUTTS: And there's nothing to stop him from doing that.

MR. BOODY: Right, because the code doesn't make it clear that that's --

MR. BUTTS: Right.
MR. BOODY: Because the code says it has to have a bathroom to be a legal --

MR. BUTTS: It's not a camper or a mobile home, aren't allowed, but there's nothing about closed trailer.

MR. BOODY: It does say, "with or without wheels," so I kind of wondered why an enclosed box --

MR. BUTTS: You know, this is --

this is why when they issue and then, "Oh, I can't" -- and the (inaudible) comes back and he says, "Oh, that's" -- "It doesn't work." So that means we have to change it if we have problems.

MR. BOODY: Okay. So this might indicate there's a little -MR. BUTTS: Yeah. MR. BOODY: -- fuzzy area that -MAYOR FIORE: It's something missing.

MR. BOODY: -- needs some clearing up.

MAYOR FIORE: What is the intention of our trailer code? To keep people from living in a trailer on one of our residential properties, right?

MR. BUTTS: To make this -- this is a bedlam community, not any place for trailers.

MAYOR FIORE: Right. So what I'm saying is, what is the intention of our No Trailer Code? It is to keep people from living in a trailer that is placed on a
residential property, right?

MR. BOODY: I think so.
MAYOR FIORE: Okay.
MR. BUTTS: And that does that, but it doesn't do anything about a -- just a trailer.

MR. BOODY: It's just plopped in there.

MR. BUTTS: Right.
MR. BOODY: It may not have a bathroom.

MR. BUTTS: Right.
MR. ABRAHAM: It's just a trailer.
MR. BUTTS: You got it.
MR. BOODY: It's just being --
MR. BUTTS: It's nothing to keep a --

MR. BOODY: The code doesn't clearly make that illegal.

MS. DIAT: Yes.
MR. ABRAHAM: And what kind of
trailer was it?
MS. DIAT: So I think the concern is around people having, like, housing,

MAYOR FIORE: So I would think that an inhabitable trailer is what we want to make sure we can't put on somebody's property. But a POD is basically a container. It has no windows, it has no do- -- it's just got two big doors. That's not an inhabitable trailer. A landscape trailer with barn sides is not an inhabitable trailer, so.

MS. DIAT: But $I$ would think we would not want to allow people to house
landscape trailers as well on their
property.
MR. BOODY: Yeah, permanently.
Yeah.
MAYOR FIORE: Well, what if you
have a trailer that you put wood in? Joe
Zaykowski does. He can't put that on his
property? It's a trailer that he hooks up
to his pickup truck.

MS. DIAT: Commercial landscape trailers, every day.

MAYOR FIORE: No, I'm talking about, you know, a trailer that you hook up to your pickup truck.

MS. DIAT: Okay, but I think we can define -- define them such that maybe commercial landscape --

MAYOR FIORE: Yeah.
MS. DIAT: -- trailers are not --
MAYOR FIORE: Yeah. If it's a commercial license plate, yes.

MR. BUTTS: The little one that Joe has --

MAYOR FIORE: Okay, so then we -well, then we have to dictate that it would be commercial plates and it's a commercial trailer and you can't put it on your property. But $I$ don't want to tell Joe that he's gotta burn his trailer after 65 years, yeah.

MR. BUTTS: Yeah.
MAYOR FIORE: So you two want to deal with this?

MR. BOODY: Yeah.
MS. DIAT: Maybe we should take another look.

MAYOR FIORE: Yeah, take a look?
MR. BOODY: Can $I$-- can $I$ meet with you, George, and just --

MR. BUTTS: Sure.
MR. BOODY: -- to get a little
more detail about it? And then I'll call
you, Terie, and --

MAYOR FIORE: Sure.

MR. ABRAHAM: I think this section
in our code is because I had somebody ask me two years ago about that, where there was a conflict about an enclosed trailer that looked like a -- one of those landscaping trailers, but it wasn't a landscaping trailer. It was actually somebody who goes -- races motorcycles. And he had, like, basically --

MAYOR FIORE: He had his motorcycle trailer.

MR. ABRAHAM: Yeah, but it was -MAYOR FIORE: But that's not commercial.

MR. ABRAHAM: It was enclosed. It was not commercial.

MAYOR FIORE: Yeah, but it's not commercial. So you'll have to discuss that, look into that, and then decide whether you want to make that okay or not okay.

MR. BOODY: If you want, meet with

MAYOR FIORE: And, but I also don't want to rush to judgment and say, okay, you know, we don't have any applications for a pickleball court, and the one in question is a grandfathered tennis court. So I would want to tread lightly before we decide.

I know you would like to ban it, just put in a ban. I don't know if that's -- it is the fastest-growing sport in America. It's gonna be an Olympic sport in the next Olympics. The guy from the Dallas Cowboys just bought the Austin pickleball team so he's making it a -- you know, it's a big, big thing. It's a big, big thing.

So I just don't want to rush to
judgment. I'd like to get Jerry Larsen, Mayor Larsen, his Honor's noise attenuation evaluation.

And since we don't have any applications and we only have one person who is annoyed by the sound and we're going into the winter, $I$ would think that we could take our time to do our homework, and that's what I'd like to do.

MR. ABRAHAM: I mean, again, nobody would build just a pickleball court, right?

MAYOR FIORE: Nobody has applied for just a pickleball court.

MR. ABRAHAM: So, and --
MAYOR FIORE: We could put in a ban of just pickleball courts. We could do that.

MS. DIAT: Well, we could put in a moratorium --

MAYOR FIORE: Yeah. That's what I meant, yes.

MS. DIAT: -- for the -- which is a short-term measure, right.

MAYOR FIORE: Yes.

So, first of all, the most excellent news, so the --

MAYOR FIORE: Most excellent.
MS. DIAT: The most excellent news. So the Town of Southampton CPF, Community Preservation Fund, awarded the grant to North Haven to put in a innovative/alternative septic upgrade system for Village Hall here. So our grant was for $\$ 73,250$, so we will get that money. I believe we will need to bid that out, and so the intention is we will probably start that project in the spring.

MR. ABRAHAM: Where is the money coming from?

MAYOR FIORE: The CPF.
MS. DIAT: Southampton CPF.
MR. ABRAHAM: CPF?
MAYOR FIORE: CPF, yeah.
MS. DIAT: Southampton CPF.
The Village did commit matching
funds of $\$ 4,000$ that we will need to put up. $\$ 1,000$ of that was for an electrical
permit, and $\$ 3,000$ is for the bidding that
Raynor Group will do for us. So that was
excellent news.
MAYOR FIORE: Yeah, that's really
good.
MS. DIAT: Yes. And we are
awaiting official confirmation from CPF
for that. I did follow up with them and
they said, yes, they're working on that
and it will come.
MAYOR FIORE: How far are we from
the wetlands in this building? How close
is the closest designated wetland? 100
feet? Do you know, George?
MS. DIAT: They did the survey. I
mean, I don't --
MR. BUTTS: Where that fence is
back there --
MAYOR FIORE: Yeah.
MR. BUTTS: -- is approximately 50
feet away from the wetlands, where it
starts.

MAYOR FIORE: Okay.
MS. DIAT: Yeah. It will be
installed on the other side. It's --

MAYOR FIORE: Yeah.
MS. DIAT: You remember where the engineering was, right?

MAYOR FIORE: Yes.
MS. DIAT: It's gonna be where the kiosk will come down. It'll be on the other side of Village Hall over there.

MAYOR FIORE: The reason $I$ ask is because conventional -- obviously, we all know that conventional septic systems are the worst distributor of nitrogen --

MS. DIAT: Yeah.
MAYOR FIORE: -- and the worst effect on clean water. After that, you got fertilizers and chemicals and stuff like that.

So an I/A system for people who live very close to an estuary or a wetland or something like that, maybe we could start a program where we encourage those people who -- you know, we can certainly identify it with a map of North Haven. The people who are closest to 50 feet, 75

feet to a wetland or an estuary that we could just verbally or with a letter encourage them to upgrade their system to an I/A system.

MS. DIAT: Well, that's what we did this year, right. We had the presentation in June --

MAYOR FIORE: Yeah, you had 35 people here.

MS. DIAT: -- where Suffolk

County -- yeah, when Suffolk County Health
Department came with --
MAYOR FIORE: Right.
MS. DIAT: -- Peconic Estuary
Partnership, right.
MAYOR FIORE: Right. I got it. I remember.

MS. DIAT: And we told them all about the rebates, right.

So we're encouraging everybody, actually, because North Haven is so small, that actually everybody's effluent eventually makes --

MAYOR FIORE: True.

MS. DIAT: -- its way to our bays or our critical creeks and ponds that we have here.

MR. BOODY: Within two years, any--- anyplace, right?

MS. DIAT: Yeah. There's been studies done by the PEP. I could pull those out and tell you what the travel time is. I don't have that off the top of my head. But we are so small because, what, we're two square miles, but -MAYOR FIORE: Right.

MS. DIAT: -- everybody's nitrogen or effluent that uses nitrogen --

MAYOR FIORE: Right, poop.
MS. DIAT: -- makes its way.
MAYOR FIORE: Yes.
MS. DIAT: So, yes, the people that are on the waterfront or close to wetlands are most critical. But really every homeowner in North Haven --

MAYOR FIORE: Sure.
MS. DIAT: -- we are encouraging to do it, yeah.

is, you all will recall that earlier, actually it was in the December Board of Trustees meeting last year, December 2022, we approved the proposal from Dr. Gobler's lab to do water quality testing through -throughout this year in North Haven. It was for twenty-six thousand --

MAYOR FIORE: 26, yeah, 300 .
MS. DIAT: -- three hundred seventy-three dollars. So that took place throughout this year. It started May, it ended in October, two times a month. And so we are now ready to make the payment.

The way we are facilitating that payment, the way it works with Stony Brook University, you have to have a contract with them to make the payment, and so we are facilitating that payment through the East Hampton Trustees. That's the way all the villages make the payment.

So the East Hampton Trustees have approved that in their November 13 th meeting and so we have a resolution
tonight to approve that payment. We are adding it, actually, to the agreement that Sag Harbor has with the East Hampton Trustees.

So we will ask to approve that via resolution tonight, and there's a document for you to sign, Chris.

MAYOR FIORE: Where is it? It's on this list, right?

MS. DIAT: I don't know that we had it on the list.

MAYOR FIORE: I didn't -- I don't remember seeing it.

MR. DEYERMOND: Yup, should be --
MAYOR FIORE: Is it?
MS. DIAT: Yeah. So --
MAYOR FIORE: Here it is.
MS. DIAT: -- that's just a reminder to us.

MR. ABRAHAM: So the -- they took water samples for the last twelve months, ten months, something --

MS. DIAT: From May -- starting in May through October, two times a month,

MR. ABRAHAM: Okay. And when will we be able to --

MS. DIAT: So -- see the results?
So we have not seen the results yet. I've been -- so he will give us a report, a formal report. And $I$ believe he will either come or do it via Zoom to the Board to give a report out in -- it's in the March or April timeframe is when he comes to all the villages to make the report.

I have been asking for some early summary of it and he has promised to give that, I'm hoping, soon, so we can get some early insights. The Water Quality Committee is mad and we would -- we'd like to see them release insights to help us -we've developed our program for going into next year, but we'd really like some insights as to what the results are. So I'm hoping soon we'll see some graphs on the results.

MR. ABRAHAM: Will we see some sort of, like, reference data in there as

well?
MS. DIAT: So, meaning?
MR. ABRAHAM: It compares, you know, like, this result, you can compare it to another body of water, or what is the ideal value or stuff like that.

MS. DIAT: So, definitely --

MS. DIAT: Yes, yes, against --
MR. ABRAHAM: Okay.
MS. DIAT: Against thresholds, yes, absolutely.

MR. ABRAHAM: Okay.
MS. DIAT: You might remember he did a baseline. Last September, he did two gratis -- he did two readings last September, and he'll tell us what's -- you know, what's normal and what's not.

MR. ABRAHAM: Okay.
MS. DIAT: So I'm hoping -- he had told me he would give an early look about two weeks ago and $I$ haven't gotten it yet, so I'm hoping someday soon we will get
that without having to wait until March or April to see it.

MR. BOODY: I have a question that just may be historical, and it's just interesting phenomenon. I see that in 2022, according to this information, five entities spent $\$ 15,500$.

MS. DIAT: That's Sag Harbor.
You're seeing the Sag Harbor agreement that we're being added to in order to make our payment.

MR. BOODY: Yeah. It was -- and there was an amount paid by East Hampton Town, Sag Harbor --

MS. DIAT: Yes.

certainly result in some very strong improvement in water quality. I mean, that was probably the whole reason why the quality of the water was somewhat subpar.

MR. ABRAHAM: Did they dredge again after the completion of the -MAYOR FIORE: He's dredging right now, yeah, or he's coming back very soon. They just got the permit, yeah. Yeah. And they had a permit, but it expired and they had to renew the permit, so you have to go through the whole thing all over again.

Okay. Before we leave Old Business, I just wanted to tell you that the Department of Transportation has approved signage. They can't tell me when the speed limits will be changed on Ferry Road. They will try to give me a week's notice. They will change the speed limit signs. They'll put "New" on top of the speed limit signs, which will remain for six months. They will also put in four of the digital articulated signs announcing
the new speed limit. They will not paint "30 miles an hour" on the road as you come off the ferry. They don't do that. They get many requests, they said, but they find that it is aesthetically not pleasing.

We have been looking and been waiting for a year for them to approve your radar signs. You just got another e-mail from Rick.

MR. ABRAHAM: They had something else.

MAYOR FIORE: And they need three things. They could -- honest to God, they could install the Angel of Death, the Department of Transportation. It's just -- it's always something else. And then the guy in charge is off until the $27 t h$ and we have to wait for him to come back. It's just maddening, I have to say.

MR. ABRAHAM: The last addition to whatever we submitted, he had for --

MAYOR FIORE: Oh, he had it for four months.

MR. ABRAHAM: He had it for four months.

She will be here at 9:00 tomorrow morning for a meet-and-greet with the ladies in the office. And, George, if you're here, too, it's Thursday, I hope you're here. I would invite you all to come in at 9:00 tomorrow morning and say "hello" to her and meet her if you're
here. I'll be here. Ed'll be here, et cetera, et cetera.

And $I$ think she will be -- she's very, very knowledgeable. I did extensive references on her, back-channel references, as well as -- as well as up-channel references, references that she gave me. I don't honestly think too much, if $I$ asked you for a reference and you gave me the editor of Joe Shaw, I would say, okay, fine, he's a friend and he's gonna say (inaudible). Of course he's gonna say something nice.

But $I$ do like -- and in business $I$ used a lot of back-channel references where you just call somebody and you say, "Look, you know, I'm never gonna reveal what you're saying and I'm never gonna identify you, but what do you think of this person?"

And, and I have to tell you, I got very strong references from everyone I spoke to, including three mayors of Sag Harbor, and two -- and one clerk.

Somebody else. I did five of these. And I feel very confident that she brings a level of talent and experience to this job that we really need and we will -- we will enjoy for a number of years, certainly a minimum of two, which is what the -- which is what this semi-contract is for. And I would say that, Be it Resolved, that the Mayor of the Village of North Haven -- am I allowed to read this, 'cause I'm the mayor. Yeah? Okay. That the Mayor of the Village be and hereby is authorized and directed to appoint Ms. Beth Kamper as the Village Clerk/Treasurer effective tomorrow, November 16, 2023, and to execute a proposed two-calendar year contract for her compensation and benefits, a copy of which is now before the Board -- it's attached to this -- and a copy of which is on file in the Village Clerk's office. All subject to the approval of Ms.

Kamper's appointment by the Suffolk County Civil Service Personnel Office. Effective

The Civil Service has to approve -- even if she's not civil service, it has to approve the position and the salary.

The retirement, as you know, if she did not freeze her retirement, it would only allow her to earn $\$ 35,000$ a year. We're gonna pay her more than that, clearly. If she takes a job and loses it within two years, she has a serious detriment to her retirement.

So I talked to Ed. I talked to Scott. I talked to this gentleman Peter Bee, who is a municipal and a labor attorney who works for SCVOA. And they -we all --

MAYOR FIORE: FOr everything you've done for us, $I$ have to tell ya, Ed,
north haven bot - Regular meeting - $11 / 15 / 2023$ it's --

MR. ABRAHAM: Thank you for keeping us afloat.

MAYOR FIORE: We'd be having this meeting out in the parking lot if it weren't for you.

There should also be, Ed, a page that says we can pay the law firm. Yeah, here it is.

Here is another resolution because Mr. Bee, who is the labor attorney, who was recommended to me by Scott because Scott does not do municipal employee specialities, okay, so he told me to call Peter Bee. Peter Bee works for SCVOA and his advice is free to mayors and clerks within Suffolk County.

I asked him if he would draw up her retirement freeze paperwork, et cetera. He said, "That is not within the scope of my free work. I will have to charge you \$350 an hour." I said, "Fine, what do you think it's gonna take?" He said, "No more than two hours." I said,
"Fine."

This is, therefore, resolved. This is the resolution that the Mayor be and is hereby -- and he hereby is authorized to retain the law firm of Bee, Ready, Fishbein, Hatter \& Donovan at an hourly rate of $\$ 325$ an hour to assist the Village in the civil service process of retaining Ms. Beth Kamper as the Village's Clerk, an exempt civil service title.

I would further say that the maximum that we will pay Mr. Bee is $\$ 1,000$. That would be two-and-a-half hours, which more than covers the effort that he has put into this.

MR. BOODY: And this is paperwork that we file, not Beth?

MAYOR FIORE: This is paperwork that I -- we both -- we both need to sign it. Paperwork that $I$ will submit to the civil service and then she will sign as the employee.

MR. BOODY: But it's not something she can do completely on her own?

MAYOR FIORE: NO.
MR. BOODY: We have to hire an
attorney who knows how to do this.
MAYOR FIORE: Right.
MR. BOODY: Okay.
MAYOR FIORE: Right. She could hire an attorney. She could hire Mr. Bee, but $I$ don't think that would -- I don't think that's appropriate.

MR. BOODY: Yeah.
MS. DIAT: I'll make the motion.
MAYOR FIORE: Motion. Thank you
so much. Second?
MR. BOODY: Second.
MAYOR FIORE: Aye?
ALL BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
MAYOR FIORE: Okay. Last one.
Whereas, in light of the
retirement of our Public Works staffer - who is Glen Ficorelli -- the Village is in need of equipment to continue with our upcoming leaf program. Mayor Fiore has been earnestly looking for replacement equipment in order to preserve this function.

I would have to say that the Mayor and the Deputy Clerk have been also searching earnestly for a contractor to do this and we -- we, as you know, have not been successful in having someone bid. That's not part of the resolution.

Mayor Fiore has earnestly been looking for replacement equipment in order to preserve this function, and

Whereas, the Mayor has been consulting with both our Village Attorney and the New York Conference of Mayors on a roadmap to accomplish this.

Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved that the Village of North Haven purchase of 2000 GMC six-wheel dump truck, a Tarrent Big $T$ Leaf Vacuum (TTL-1) leaf loader and a leaf box for a total of $\$ 25,000$ from Mr. Glen Ficorelli.

This is the same vehicle and mulcher that Mr. Ficorelli has used picking up leaves in our Village for the last $X$ number of years. The price of the

truck is $\$ 19,000$. The price of the mulcher is $\$ 6,000$. It is cleared by -not SCVOA. What's the other one? NYCOM. We've talked to NYCOM and we've talked to Scott. And Scott's letter approving the legal portion of this purchase is attached and it basically says the same thing that $I$ just said, and please read it.

He ends by saying, "In my opinion, the Village may move forward with the purchase of these two pieces of equipment without the need for a bid."

MR. BOODY: And you -- you did a
lot of footwork, checking comps in the region, and found nothing anywhere -MAYOR FIORE: I actually went beyond 50 miles. I couldn't find anything within 50 miles. So $I$ went to 150 miles and $I$ found three similar trucks, all of whom were at least $\$ 8,000$, more expensive than our $\$ 19,000$ one. I couldn't find a mulcher within 600 miles. I found two. One's in Michigan, one's in Virginia, and

it's identical to this one, the Tarrent T-1.

MR. BOODY: And you might want to point out publically that Glen's unable to take the job as a contractor.

MAYOR FIORE: Glen can't do it as a contractor because he had surgery on his neck. I asked him. I mean, that's -that would have been wonderful, to have Glen drive his truck and just do the job again, but he can't because of the surgery that he had on his neck. And he said he just can't -- he just can't handle that. So we buy Glen's truck. Steve Hessler, who is our employee, drives it. We don't pay -- what is it called, a prevailing wage, because we're paying our own employee.

I did work out with the two abusers -- there were two residences that really abused this pickup, and I did work out with the owners of the residences that they will be limited to one truckload of mulch/leaves. Last year they had ten

truckloads each, and that -- that
seriously negatively affected the expense that we paid Glen.

So I'm hoping that, unless for
some reason we have a lot more leaves this year, we have -- we have eighteen less truckloads from this particular road on which these two residences exist. I'm hoping that we can spend less money than we did last year.

MR. ABRAHAM: So I think it's important to note that even within one year of this investment basically pays off compared to --

MAYOR FIORE: It pays off, yeah.
MR. ABRAHAM: -- what we have -MAYOR FIORE: Yeah.

MR. ABRAHAM: -- paid in the past.
So even if the -- even if this truck only makes it three years, whatever it is --

MAYOR FIORE: Even if.
MR. ABRAHAM: -- it pays off in
the first year. It's like from the

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    appreciation and writing this thing off, you know, it's like -- it's sort of, like, okay, we can do it this year and every year after that it's basically -MAYOR FIORE: It's free. MR. ABRAHAM: It's -- yeah. (Inaudible) or whatever. MAYOR FIORE: To be completely transparent, Epic Insurance told me originally that it should be about \(\$ 1,500\) annually. I called her again today and she said she doesn't have the number yet and it might be 2,000 but it's not gonna be more than 2,500 . So it's somewhere now between 1,500 and 2,500. I told her it's a 2,000. We don't need comprehensive. I put the deductible at \(\$ 5,000\), and it registers less than 1,000 miles a year. So by rights, it shouldn't be more than \(\$ 1,500\), yes, sir.
    MR. BUTTS: Where will you keep this equipment?
MAYOR FIORE: Pardon me?
MR. BUTTS: Where will you keep

MAYOR FIORE: We will house the equipment at Steve Hessler's yard, yeah, for no charge. And he will not use it for any other purpose than either Village business or leaf pickup. And \(I\) trust him. He doesn't need -- he's got four trucks, brand new, he doesn't need this one, for his own business.

MR. BUTTS: With better equipment than that you bought, that's all I'm just trying --

MAYOR FIORE: He owns better equipment, yeah. Younger, better equipment than this truck, yeah. But in order for him to use it, Scott would not allow him to use his equipment. From a legal perspective, it is -- he is adamant that we own the equipment and that we do not renew the kind of agreement we had with Glen, which is why we had to buy his lawnmower.

MR. BUTTS: I understand, I understand.

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MAYOR FIORE: Yeah. It took a while for me to get on the program because I just -- you know, it worked so well for 39 years, but we were -- we were pushing the envelope. Yeah.
MR. BOODY: So I think that limit on the number of truckloads per yard --
MAYOR FIORE: I think that's huge.
MR. BOODY: -- is a --
MR. ABRAHAM: Yeah.
MR. BOODY: -- brilliant idea that it's too bad we didn't think of before.
MAYOR FIORE: And \(I\) only learned it by talking to Glen and talking through the whole thing. I know more about leaf pickup now than \(I\) really ever will need to know.
MR. BOODY: Yeah.
MR. ABRAHAM: Is Steve gonna keep
a track record on that?
MAYOR FIORE: Pardon me?
MR. ABRAHAM: Is Steve gonna keep
a track record on, like --

right, one truck --

So next week may be too soon, right.

If we wait for Mrs. Frye, for example, who's already got four big piles out on the road, if we wait until it rains, now it gets soggy, now it weighs more, et cetera, et cetera. If you wait until December, the middle of December and they freeze, now you need a front-end loader to move them up --

road. They're -- well, some of them are on the shoulder, $I$ know.

MR. BUTTS: Southampton Village -MAYOR FIORE: Yeah.

MR. BUTTS: -- if you, as a person that owns the property, carts the leaves out to the road, it's fine. You can't have twenty guys that's working in your yard and carrying them all out there and then they don't pick them up. They don't do it that way. So there are many different ways where you could trim it all.

MAYOR FIORE: Well --
MR. BUTTS: Your -- the gentleman that brought ten truck-fulls last year -MAYOR FIORE: Yes.

MR. BUTTS: -- he didn't do the work. He hired somebody.

MAYOR FIORE: Oh, his landscapers kept bring leaves out to the road, yes. MR. BUTTS: Right, and that's -that's not -MAYOR FIORE: Well, that's not
what we're doing this year.

MR. BUTTS: Right. But I'm just saying, you could just say, "No, we're not bringing" -- "We're not picking them up." MAYOR FIORE: So you're saying they gotta be there.

MR. BUTTS: You got it.
MAYOR FIORE: Yes, on the side of the road.

MR. BUTTS: Yeah.
MAYOR FIORE: Yes.
MR. ABRAHAM: And where were

## those?

MAYOR FIORE: Those were the gentleman with whom $I$ spoke.

MR. ABRAHAM: Okay, but they were not on the side of the road. They were --

MAYOR FIORE: They were constantly being fed to Glen's truck. And Glen being the guy that he is, the wonderful guy that he is, he kept going back and getting more leaves. We're not doing that this year.

And we will publish a specific schedule by road, by date.

MR. ABRAHAM: Well, similar to what Southampton had done in their --

MAYOR FIORE: Yeah. They all do. They all do it.

MR. ABRAHAM: -- in their leaf newsletter.

MAYOR FIORE: We all do it.

MAYOR FIORE: Yeah. And it's
important that only leaves; no twigs, no -- no junk, no nothing. It's just leaves.

And in order to save $\$ 50,000$ a year, we have the approval of Mayor Gardella, who I asked if we could dump our leaves in his Sag Harbor yard at no charge again, and he gave me the green light. He has to approve it every year, apparently. And if we had to go to the Town of Southampton dump with the same forty loads, it would cost us $\$ 50,000$. It's a ridiculous price. So we're very -- we're very indebted to Sag Harbor for that favor, yes. Glen worked that out
north haven bot - Regular meeting - 11/15/2023 originally, so.

So, all right, that's the truck. That's the leaf mulcher. That's Steve Hessler and his part-timer, who is also on our payroll.

MR. BOODY: And it's Peter Bee.
MAYOR FIORE: And it's Peter Bee, yup.

MR. ABRAHAM: Do we do a motion? MAYOR FIORE: No, not yet.

So can we do a motion for this truck?

MR. ABRAHAM: I'll make a motion to approve the resolution to purchase this truck and leaf mulcher.

MAYOR FIORE: Thank you so much. MR. BOODY: Second. MAYOR FIORE: Second. ALL BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. MAYOR FIORE: Do we have an "aye?" We have an "aye." Thank you so much. Excellent.

MR. BOODY: And we did the motion on Bee, right?

First of all, listening to this, I've been listening to a few of the meetings. I'd like to thank you all for the considerable time you spend, each of you, without pay, running the Village dealing with hundreds, sounds like thousands of issues, both small and large and, you know, keeping this issue --

MR. VOS: -- about, roughly, 4,000 square foot area, which is a pretty large area, missing wetlands buffer. You know, this is the largest -- it's on the largest pond connecting our two big estuary systems, which is important for wildife in the Village.

And I attached the 2014 Planning Board approval and a Google Maps photo showing that area still being cleared. You know, it's -- I'm an environmentalist, so it's upsetting to me. But I realize, you know, things happen.

And $I$ remember earlier this year,

I think the Village, monthly e-mail or something, I do remember a description about how code violations henceforth would be followed up on more promptly. A different system was devised, which is great.

So I just have three questions. One is -- hold on a second. One is, has 4 Sunset Road been inspected by code enforcement or whoever should inspect it? Has there been an inspection, yes or no? Number two, has there been a resolution, any enforcement actions? What's the result? What's the resolution? And number three, I realize this is kind of awkward, but given that -given that it's the mayor's property, Mayor Fiore, it's your property, are you all comfortable that there's no, you know, appearance of conflict of interest vis-à-vis inspection and enforcement? Thank you very much. Those are my three questions.

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                                    MAYOR FIORE: I don't really feel
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that it's appropriate for me to address that at a Board of Trustees meeting. I think if you wrote an e-mail to the Village Clerk and the Building Inspector and the code enforcement officer, I think your business is really with them. So I'm not -- I'm not going to address that. MR. ABRAHAM: Or the Board of Trustees.
MAYOR FIORE: Or the Board of Trustees, yeah.
MS. DIAT: I'm sorry, could you repeat what measures you have taken? Have you written an e-mail requesting code enforcement?

MR. VOS: We have an application in and we expect finally to get it through the paperwork in a month or two. But we are putting in an I/A system, 100 percent yes, and it's in the works.
