3 1 NORTH HAVEN BOT WORK SESSION - 10/4/2022 2 MAYOR FIORE: We'll start with the 3 Pledge of Allegiance. (Whereupon, the Pledge of 4 5 Allegiance was recited.) 6 MAYOR FIORE: Okay. We will start 7 the special Board of Trustees meeting. Thank you for attending. We have two 8 9 people here in person, Stella Sands and Stephanie Joyce. We have a bunch of 10 11 people on Zoom. And, Eileen, can you text 12 Scott? 13 MS. TUOHY: I can. 14 MAYOR FIORE: Please, yeah, and 15 just ask him to get on. 16 So our discussion items start with 17 appointing a -- discussing the appointment 18 of a committee, and the committee would be 19 a committee that would liaise with both 20 the 501 Board and the Village Board of 21 Trustees. This committee would be made up 22 of two trustees. Is Dianne here, by the 23 way? Yeah, there she is. Just, hang on. 24 The Mayor, a trustee, and at least one 25 landscape, probably two landscape experts.

2 This Board would work with the 501 3 Board on ideas that you have for the park 4 and this Board would then present those ideas to the Board of Trustees who would 5 have ultimate approval/denial rights over 6 7 those ideas. The 501 Board, whose job is, in many people's estimation, pretty much 8 9 done as far as elements for the park, but 10 they need to be fine-tuned by people who 11 really know landscaping. And the 501 12 Board needs to concentrate on fundraising 13 and contributions and naming rights, 14 similar, in essence, to what Scott 15 Middleton, our Village Attorney, had 16 e-mailed to us and you about ten days ago. 17 So we would like to propose that I 18 would be joined by Dianne Skilbred, who is the head of Parks & Trails. Dianne is 19 here on Zoom because she, too, well, she 20 doesn't have Covid, but Dianne's on Zoom 21 22 with a non-Covid, very bad cold. Terie's 23 on Zoom with a husband in her car who

tested positive for Covid this morning, so. And Eileen also tested positive for

And Scott Middleton has just 7 joined the meeting, and Scott Middleton is 8 our Village attorney. Scott, you there? 9 MR. ABRAHAM: I'm connecting to audio. Now he's there. 10 11 MAYOR FIORE: Okay. 12 MR. ABRAHAM: Just needs to unmute 13 himself. 14 MAYOR FIORE: Scott, you with us? Scott Middleton, come in? 15 MR. MIDDLETON: Yes. 16 17 MS. TUOHY: There he is. 18 MAYOR FIORE: There he is. Okay, 19 good. 20 MR. MIDDLETON: How are you? 21 MAYOR FIORE: Okay. Max is not here, but he is supposed to be 13 on -- he's supposed to be here on Zoom, 14 15 but I think he's tuned into a 4:00 number, 16 so. 17 MR. MIDDLETON: Okay. 18 MAYOR FIORE: So, Scott, did you 19 want to --20 MR. MIDDLETON: Sure. 21 MAYOR FIORE: Did you want to 22 review that? 23 MR. MIDDLETON: Sure. MIDDLETON: And that's, that's 8 kind of where I form the basis of my 9 thoughts on what the not-for-profit corporation's obligations are under the --10 11 not only under the Certificate of 12 Incorporation, but just, you know, what 13 people were thinking when it was formed. 14 So, you know, in the Certificate of 15 Incorporation, basically it's pretty broad, pretty general. 16 But when I look back at what Jeff 17 18 had indicated, it seems to me that the idea was for this not-for-profit to go out 19 20 and fundraise for various projects that 21 the Village Board wanted to accomplish at 22 this particular park, and not just this 23 particular park, but also the other 24 trails, which is why Jeff came up with the name for the organization, you know, the 25

MIDDLETON: -- Association. 5 So, you know, and then when we 6 look at the IMA with the Town, that sort 7 of spells out, you know, what the 8 Village's obligations are. 9 So, to me, when I look at it, if there's a gift that somebody wants to make 10 11 on behalf of something honoring somebody, whatever it might be, if there's a bench 12 13 or a tree or whatever it might be that the 14 Village Board thinks is appropriate, the 15 not-for-profit can report to the Village Board before the establishment of this 16 committee or to this committee afterwards 17 18 and say, you know, this person wants to donate 10,000 and have a bench named, et 19 20 cetera, et cetera, so, and they like this 21 style bench and this is what we're 22 recommending. That's fine. But the rest 23 of it, really, it's really up to the 24 Village what happens in that park because 25 of the IMA with the Town.

MR. MIDDLETON: Anybody have any 10 11 questions, suggestions or anything else 12 that I might be able to help with? MAYOR FIORE: I do want to mention 13 14 that this is a special meeting between the 15 501 Board and the Village Board of Trustees, so it is -- it is really -- the 16 17 discussion is really for the two boards. 18 I can open up the meeting for public input at the end of the final meeting. 19 20 MR. MIDDLETON: That's fine. 21 MS. DIAT: Yeah. I'd just like to 22 say, I think that's -- I think that's a 23 fair description, Scott, but I do think 24 that since the beginning of the inception of the not-for-profit board, that I 25

So I think 5 the role that they've been playing has 6 7 been expanded beyond fundraising 8 activities. So I think certainly they've 9 been playing an expanded role since the beginning. You know, it hasn't been 10 narrowly focused on fundraising, so 11 12 whether it was defined only as fundraising at the beginning, they've been doing more 13 than that. 14 MAYOR FIORE: Well, I think that's 15 16 a fair statement because, in the 17 beginning, when we formed this committee 18 in January of 2022, there was no -- there were no elements of the park to raise 19 20 money for. 21 So the first thing that we 22 concentrated on -- and I remember giving 23 the list of potential donors to the three 24 members of the Board and saying, "Okay, we 25 need to contact these people as soon as we

NORTH HAVEN BOT WORK SESSION - 10/4/2022 get an idea, as soon as we have something that's congealed together, to say, 'All right, now this is what we'd like to do and we would really like you to contribute.'"

7 But the first six months of this project, we spent developing concepts and 8 9 ideas for the park. We collaborated with each other and then I presented a general, 10 11 a general representation of the park to 12 the residents by in-person presentation 13 followed by a Zoom presentation back in 14 May.

15 Since that time, the Board, the 501 Board has deleted a few items and has 16 made adjustments to that plan. We lost 17 18 those concrete chess tables by -- because the Board said, you know, maybe that's 19 20 too -- maybe that's too New York City, maybe we don't need that, maybe that's too 21 22 much clutter, maybe we would like it a 23 little bit, a little bit lighter, a little 24 bit more natural. So the Board took out 25 the performance platform. The Board voted

10 Okay. So we were -- we then 11 concentrated, as a Board -- on which I was 12 not, as I'm just the liaison between the 13 Board and the Village Board of Trustees. 14 Jeff Sander appointed me to that role back 15 in January when I was a Trustee. I don't think it's right for me to continue that 16 17 as Mayor, which is part of the reason why 18 we would like to form a committee to be the liaison between the two boards. 19

20 But now that we have a plan that 21 is very much, that is very much close to 22 approval by, I think, everyone involved, 23 now is time for fundraising so that we can 24 put dollars to ideas. If you've got --25 and we intend to have a formal fundraising

I have, personally, raised 5 in excess of \$100,000, and that was just 6 7 through a family foundation that I was 8 aware of and that I made a presentation 9 to, and the presentation I made was this park, was this park that we're talking 10 11 about. 12 MR. MIDDLETON: One of the things 13 that I'm not privy to at this point is whether or not the not-for-profit has 14 hired an accounting firm, because I think 15 that they should sooner rather than later. 16 17 MAYOR FIORE: No, we have not yet, 18 although Eileen and I have talked about 19 candidates for the accounting firm, and 20 you were also gonna give me the name of 21 the Bridgehampton firm --22 MR. MIDDLETON: Right. 23 MAYOR FIORE: -- that you're

familiar with. 24

Ιt went from Markowitz Fenelon & Bank to 5 6 Friedman to now Marcum, so. 7 MAYOR FIORE: Oh, okay. 8 MR. MIDDLETON: The people that 9 are in the Bridgehampton office have been there for a long time. It's, you know --10 11 MAYOR FIORE: Yeah, because we 12 have to acknowledge, this is the first 13 donation that we've gotten. There's another one on deck, but we have to 14 15 acknowledge those. We have to make sure that all of the tax forms are up to speed, 16 17 up to snuff. 18 MR. MIDDLETON: Right. And one of 19 the things that, you know, the folks that 20 are doing the volunteer work or are 21 projected to or plan to, you know, they 22 should get the in-kind forms that most 23 not-for-profits give out so that, you 24 know, their efforts are accounted for as 25 well, so.

I mean, we've had \$100,000 -- in addition to the cash that 4 5 was raised, we have \$100,000 worth of 6 in-kind donation from Jackson Dodds, or 7 close to it. And then we anticipate a lot of the elements of the park to be donated 8 9 as well, trees, shrubbery, the RCA for the stone path, a good portion of the garden, 10 11 as well as the labyrinth. 12 MR. MIDDLETON: Okay. 13 MAYOR FIORE: So all those would 14 need to be acknowledged. 15 MR. MIDDLETON: Right. And I 16 don't know if now is a good time to 17 mention it, but I know that you've made 18 inquiries with respect to certain 19 companies for the demolition of the 20 structures on the property, but I think 21 that the Village Clerk should be 22 authorized to put that out for an official 23 bid. 24 MAYOR FIORE: Yeah, we're doing 25 that this afternoon. We can do it right

16 NORTH HAVEN BOT WORK SESSION - 10/4/2022 1 2 now, if you want. MR. MIDDLETON: You know, I 3 4 just -- I just wanted to mention it. I 5 mean, I think it's important. 6 MAYOR FIORE: Yeah. 7 MR. MIDDLETON: And I think that, you know, we're coming up on that deadline 8 9 so that needs to be addressed as soon as 10 possible. 11 MAYOR FIORE: We have -- we have 12 three bids for the demo of the house and 13 the demo of the pool and the filling of the pool. In addition to that, there's 14 15 asbestos in the very small basement and we will have to have that professionally 16 17 removed. So we will, based on your 18 recommendation, put this out to official 19 bid so that all the T's can be crossed and 20 the I's dotted. 21 MR. MIDDLETON: Okay. Very good. 22 And with respect to the committee 23 that you're going to create, my suggestion 24 is, at the next Board meeting, just do 25 that by resolution.

MIDDLETON: The creation of 4 the committee, okay? 5 MAYOR FIORE: We are not going to 6 vote on the repayment to the General Fund 7 because this is a Work Session, not an official Board of Trustees meeting, and we 8 9 are not going to vote on the resolution for Phase 1 of the Lovelady Park process. 10 That will also move to the first Board of 11 12 Trustees meeting in October, based on 13 advice from Scott. 14 MR. MIDDLETON: I think that's 15 best practices, yeah. 16 MAYOR FIORE: Okay. Very good. 17 MS. DIAT: And the resolution for 18 the process and procedures will be at the 19 next Board meeting, as well? 20 MAYOR FIORE: That will be at the 21 Board of Trustees meeting, not the work 22 session, yes. 23 MS. DIAT: Right. 24 MR. ABRAHAM: Just to confirm, 25 we're gonna have two committees, so to

MIDDLETON: Well, I don't --10 just to clarify, Claas, I don't consider 11 the 501 committee as much as, you know, 12 it's just a -- it's a not-for-profit 13 corporation that has its own board. 14 MR. ABRAHAM: Let me rephrase 15 that. We have two groups. 16 MR. MIDDLETON: Perfect. Perfect. 17 MR. ABRAHAM: Two groups. 18 MAYOR FIORE: Okay. 19 MR. MIDDLETON: I hate to get all 20 lawyer-like, but, you know. 21 MAYOR FIORE: Yeah, you are. 22 You're borderline. 23 MR. MIDDLETON: I know. MAYOR FIORE: So the October 24 25 meeting is scheduled -- October Board of

TUOHY: Correct. 4 5 MAYOR FIORE: So we are in process now of completing -- of working on and 6 7 ultimately completing by the end of the 8 year Phase 1 of this park plan. And Phase 9 1 of this park plan includes what's on your agenda in the Description of Phase of 10 11 the Lovelady Powell project. 12 Phase 1, and you can check these off, we removed all of the invasive 13 14 shrubbery, weeds, the poisonous vines, the 15 downed trees, the dead trees, the dead limbs, and all the phragmites that 16 bordered -- not all, but some of the 17 18 phragmites that bordered the park. Billy Hajek and I, he is our 19 environmental consultant. He and I had a 20 21 Zoom call with the Department of 22 Environmental Conservation back in May. 23 And when they looked at the property, they 24 told us they had no jurisdiction over 25 Sebastian Pond, which is where we're

NORTH HAVEN BOT WORK SESSION - 10/4/2022 1 2 working right now. They did have 3 jurisdiction over the small goose pond, which is right off Sunset Beach Road. And 4 what I call the South Pond, I don't know 5 an official name for that, which is the 6 7 pond that is enshrouded in heavy-duty 8 shrubbery across from Ryder Pond. 9 So we have applied for a cleanup 10 permit with the Department of 11 Environmental Conservation, and that takes 12 a while, and we are anticipating that 13 we'll get that, we'll get that approval 14 for the spring season. But we cannot work

within 100 feet of either of those ponds until we get the approval.

17 So we removed, through the 18 courtesy and the generosity of Jackson Dodds, his equipment, his people, his 19 20 guidance. We removed all of the 21 aforementioned landscape items. We 22 have -- we have acquired 500 pounds of Rye 23 Grass mixed seed that once, once the 24 weather clears, we will broadcast in that 25 area so that within the next three to four

NORTH HAVEN BOT WORK SESSION - 10/4/2022 weeks, we should see a lovely blanket of green lawn.

4 We will then get 160 tons of RCA, 5 which is the recycled rock that will be the base for the walking path under the 6 7 colonnade of maples, and the stone dust. That will be donated, in part, by Bistrian 8 9 Materials. They'll give it to us at their cost, not wholesale, their cost. And 10 11 another donated item -- another donator 12 will transport all of that to the worksite. 13

Jackson and Sam Panton, who's our 14 15 landscape designer and who designed the park, will install the path beneath that 16 17 column of trees. And we will plant ten 18 trees to replace the dead trees that have been removed and cut down in that 19 20 colonnade. Those will be hopefully 21 donated by landscaping companies. Jackson 22 is organizing that. He will plant them. 23 We will irrigate them on a temporary 24 irrigation basis based on the availability 25 of water from the well that's on the

That's 4 5 what I presented to the Board of Trustees 6 and received a -- what I would call a 7 green light because there was no objection to it. There was no resolution because we 8 9 hadn't passed the resolution that said we needed a resolution. So I got verbal 10 11 agreement from the Board Members that this 12 Phase 1 was good to go. Would you agree with that, Terie? 13 14 MS. DIAT: Yeah. So, I would not. 15 I did not feel like I, personally, gave the green light for that. I don't feel 16 17 like that is documented anywhere, but 18 that's my point of view on it. 19 MAYOR FIORE: Is there word from 20 any of the other Trustees? 21 MR. BOODY: I feel that we -- I 22 came in a little bit in the middle of this 23 as a Trustee, but I felt that your 24 assessment that, through discussions, we 25 had given our consent, it's true, but not

But will 12 now, you know --13 MAYOR FIORE: Right. 14 MR. ABRAHAM: -- to make it 15 watertight and proper, we'll pass resolutions to approve future work and 16 also past work. 17 18 MAYOR FIORE: Dianne? 19 MS. So 7 I don't think it's a matter of legality, but, you know, you can move forward with 8 9 doing this type of work as long as the work doesn't have to be big. That's the 10 11 only time, I think, that you'd be -- you 12 know, it's analogous to when you're 13 maintaining the park behind Village Hall and, you know, the person that works for 14 15 the Village goes and does the work. So I don't think it needs to be by resolution, 16 other than if that's what the Board wants 17 18 to do so that things are documented and it 19 makes it easy for everybody to refer to, I 20 think that's a good practice. SKILBRED: Also --3 MAYOR FIORE: And that's exactly where we are and we would have been -- we 4 would have had the process approved, but 5 there was a side discussion of -- one 6 7 element within the process about reimbursing the Village for the demolition 8 9 of the houses of the, of the two 10 structures, of the garage, and those 11 discussions delayed the vote on the 12 process until today, and now we're gonna move into the 19th. So we didn't have the 13 process in place based on the discussions 14 15 and the debate based over the \$75,000 16 proposal to remove the structures. 17 So now we will have the process 18 voted on, on the 19th at the Board of 19 Trustees meeting. TUOHY: Well, no, but you had 10 11 resolutions to spend the money. 12 MS. SKILBRED: Yes, yes, when --13 we didn't have a formal resolution. I just -- did we? 14 15 MS. TUOHY: No --16 MS. 7 We have spent a great deal of time 8 and effort attempting to save the 9 structure of the main house. We had a buyer who fell apart because the moving 10 11 costs were exorbitant. We have talked to 12 Tommy John Schiavoni. We have talked to 13 Lisa Kombrink, who was the head of the CPF, to see if there was any way that we 14 could circumvent that rule. And after six 15 months of a lot of, a lot of work and a 16 lot of energy, we are back to square one 17 18 and there does not seem to be an avenue 19 for us to save the structures. 20 So I am seeking bids on --21 official bids. I have bids that it would 22 cost \$75,000 to tear the houses down. Ιt 23 was not an official bid that was 24 advertised by Eileen, so therefore we want

Phases 2 and 3 include additional 10 11 items that could be included in the park. 12 It is what the 501 Board has arrived at after deleting a few of those items that 13 14 we talked about in May. And this Phase 2 15 and Phase 3, the timing of which will be announced, and the execution of which is 16 17 dependent upon money raised, because my 18 word to the residents of North Haven was 19 this isn't gonna cost any taxpayer 20 dollars. I was talking about the creation 21 of the park, not the demolition of the 22 buildings, because that's -- that was part 23 of our agreement with the Town of 24 Southampton, whether or not we built the 25 park or not. 7 We need about \$400,000 in cash. We have 100,000 committed. We have 50,000 8 9 in work, and we have a good bit of money to go in order to fund everything that we 10 11 want to fund. The funding is dependent 12 upon not getting anything donated. So for 13 every dollar we get donated, that takes our cash dollar need down. So if they 14 15 donate ten trees and we don't have to spend \$20,000 a tree, fine, we don't have 16 to spend that. And the donator gets a tax 17 18 break, if he chooses to do it, the 19 landscape company. And then we will also 20 sell naming rights for that tree or a 21 dedication plaque for that tree, and that 22 would be a dollar figure which is legally 23 a tax deduction for the person who is 24 donating. Certain donations will 10 11 lower that \$400,000 number and we'll be in 12 good shape.

There will 10 11 be a labyrinth or there could be a 12 labyrinth if someone decides to donate 13 money to build a labyrinth, and that might be something that would be a lovely item 14 15 to have in the park.
